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Answering the Call: People Helping People at HCFCU

At HCFCU, International Credit Union Day is a chance to give back in ways that go beyond serving juice and cookies. This year, we celebrated by hosting Market Day fundraisers at every branch in support of our triennial social responsibility partner, the Daniel R. Sayre Foundation. We also organized a free Shred Day at the Kaloko Branch to help members protect their personal information.

▶ One unexpected request, however, truly captured the spirit of the day. Tyson Klask, HCFCU's Hilo Branch Manager, received an urgent call for last-minute notary assistance. Community First Hawaii, a non-profit healthcare organization based in Hilo, had partnered with Kona Community Hospital to host an Advanced Healthcare Directive workshop. Just hours before the event, they lost one of their two volunteer notaries. The request came through a network of connections—from Community First to Hawaii Care Choices (a previous HCFCU community partner), and finally to Tyson. Tyson then reached out to the Marketing Department in Kona. Recognizing the importance of the workshop, HCFCU quickly stepped in to provide the needed notary services.

Our team's response to this request wasn't just a onetime gesture; it reflects HCFCU's philosophy of "people helping people"—a core value we've upheld since answering a similar call for notary assistance in 2008 for the Hawaii Army National Guard. The gratitude and relief we saw from those we helped reminds us that serving the community is at the heart of what we do.

Through these simple acts of kindness and community support, HCFCU celebrated International Credit Union Day by showing our commitment to the people we proudly serve.

If you are a current member and interested in serving on the Board, or would like to submit a nomination by petition, please call the Credit Union's Administrative Office at (808) 930-7603 for auglifications, information. and an application packet. All applicants will be required to sign a consent form allowing the Credit Union to conduct a credit and background check before their name is placed on the ballot. A request for an application packet may also be submitted in writing and mailed to:

Petitions must be signed by a minimum of four hundred fifty (450) Hawaii Community Federal Credit Union members who are eligible to vote (members sixteen [16] years of age or older). Along with the petition form, each nominee must submit a statement of qualifications, biographical data, and a completed application packet. The opening date for nominations by petition is February 24, 2025.

The deadline for the Nominations and Elections Committee to receive the completed nominations by petition is 5 pm on March 26, 2025. Packets may be requested or picked up at Hawaii Community Federal Credit Union's Administrative Office in Kaloko during normal business hours, Monday — Friday from 8 am to 5 pm starting on February 24, 2025. ■

Chrissy Kama Henriques, Halau E Hulali Mai I Ka La

Strengthening Community, One Dancer at a Time

For Chrissy Kama Henriques, hula is more than dance—

it's a way of life, a connection to tradition, and a gift to her community. As the founder and kumu hula of Halau E Hulali Mai I Ka La, Chrissy has dedicated herself to sharing the beauty and meaning of hula from Ka'ū to Korea.

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▶ Chrissy's hula journey began at the age of four under the guidance of the legendary Uncle Johnny Lum Ho. In 2009, she started her own halau in Captain Cook with just five haumāna (students). Today, Halau E Hulali Mai I Ka La has grown to include more than 80 haumāna, ranging in age from four to seventy-seven, with affiliated halau in Japan and Korea.



Chrissy's halau is more than just a place to learn choreography or prepare for performances—it's a space where students build identity, celebrate their culture, and strengthen community bonds. Many of her haumāna come from South Kona and Ka'ū, areas that often have fewer resources than other parts of

the island. Volunteering her time, she leads classes, designs costumes, and organizes performances, ensuring that financial limitations are never a barrier to participation. As a nonprofit organization with 501(c)(3) status, the halau is supported by a dedicated network of volunteers who contribute through costume–making, flower gathering, and administrative tasks.

Under Chrissy's leadership, Halau E Hulali Mai I Ka La has achieved recognition and awards in both hula and Tahitian competitions. Since 2017, the halau has performed at the opening ceremonies of the Merrie Monarch Festival and continues to share their love of hula at community events such as Keauhou Shopping Center's Third Fridays, the Ali'i Stroll and Street Eats in Kona, and special events at Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park.

In addition to her role as kumu hula, Chrissy is the creative force behind Living Hula, a Hawaiian clothing line inspired by her heritage and love for hula. Through both her halau and her clothing line, Chrissy honors her kumu by passing on the practices and stories that have shaped her life. With the support of volunteers and the community she calls home, she has created a space where students of all ages can grow, thrive, and carry forward the art of hula for generations to come.

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Q&A

Q: What do you enjoy most about being part of the HCFCU ohana?

The incredible support and aloha HCFCU shows our community is what I enjoy most. Programs like student Deposit Days and student tellers demonstrate a genuine com-

mitment to investing in our future and building a stronger, more connected community.

Q: How do you see hula shaping the South Kona and Kaʻū communities you serve?

Most of the time, I'm focused on the day-to-day schedule, teaching everything I've learned, and serving as a vessel for the creations Ke Akua blesses me with. But on those rare occasions when I step back and watch everyone dance, I'm deeply moved. It's emotional to see Uncle Johnny's hula style thriving in our communities, especially when I see my own daughters dance with such skill. Hula strengthens and connects our communities, one dancer at a time.

Q: You've performed at the Merrie Monarch Festival's opening ceremonies since 2017. What does that honor mean to you and your halau?

It's a tremendous honor. I've been connected to Merrie Monarch since I was four years old, back when it was held at Coconut Island. Now, as a kumu, it's humbling—and yes, it makes me feel a little old sometimes. I'm deeply grateful to Aunty Luana and her 'ohana for their tireless dedication to preserving this incredible festival. Most importantly, performing gives my students the opportunity to be part of the world's most renowned hula festival.

Q: If there is one word you could use to describe your experience with Hawaii Community Federal Credit Union, what would it be and why?

'Ohana. The staff's warmth and personal touch—knowing you by face or name—truly make you feel valued. It's a blessing to be part of such an amazing community where everyone feels connected.

Q: What inspired you to start Halau E Hulali Mai I Ka La in 2009?

I was 29 years old with two baby girls, and I knew they had to learn hula. But driving to Hilo was out of the question—that's just too far! I called Uncle Johnny to ask where I should take my girls, and right then, over the phone, he gave me his blessing to teach. That moment changed everything.

This January marks 15 years of teaching. Along with hula, I've embraced teaching Tahitian dance, Tahitian drumming, and Māori dance—just as I was taught. I also incorporate costume-making, a skill I learned from Aunty Deedee Oda. Carrying forward those teachings and Uncle Johnny's legacy inspires me every day

Q: What makes your halau special to you?

It's the connections we build with everyone who walks through our doors. Hula creates lifelong relationships and cherished memories. It has this incredible way of helping us escape the craziness of the world and bringing us to a place of peace and joy. Hula doesn't just heal the body—it heals the heart and soul. That's what makes our halau so meaningful to me.

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The Power of a Financial Reset: How to Start the Year Debt-Free

The start of a new year offers a perfect opportunity to hit the reset button on your finances. 
